Question 1

"...yes there's disappointment, pain and sorrow. But I say to myself when was it in the past 500 years that Africa has not been in great pain and sorrow and disappointment..." (Chinua Achebe). Basing your answer on the above quotation, discuss the major issues dealt with by writers in the African novel. Use specific examples from any texts of your choice.

Question 2

In the novel *A Man of the people* Chinua Achebe asserts that "a common saying in the country after Independence was that it didn't matter what you knew but who you knew and believe me it was no idle talk". Using this as a basis, discuss the major themes that Chinua Achebe deals with in the novel. In your discussion, focus on the effectiveness of the first person (1st) narrative, use of irony and satire.

Question 3

According to the Spectator, "Ayi Kwei Armah's novel is a fine treatment of the theme of corruption...contamination wrought by poverty". To what extent do you agree with this summary of The Beautyful Ones Are Not Yet born?

Question 4

Show how the use of language, imagery, symbolism in any text studied in this course expresses the author's image of independent Africa in general. Illustrate with relevant examples.
