- 2. 'The Deuteronomic expression of the covenant was influenced by and a reaction to neo-Assyrian covenant models' (R.J. Thompson, 2013).
  - a) Provide a summary of your understanding of the meaning and use of the term *'berit'* (covenant) in the Pentateuch. [20]
  - b) Analyse Thompson's proposal in the light of your understanding of the meaning and use of the term in the Pentateuch, and in neo-Assyrian covenant models. [40]
  - c) Illustrate the importance of the metaphor of covenant in both the Pentateuch and in the context of your community. [40]

  - b) Examine A. Alt (1966)'s distinction of the different types of laws that are in the Pentateuch [40]
  - c) Discuss the significance and relevance of the laws in the Pentateuch to your faith-community. [40]
